Adam goes for a blood test











What happens next...



Adam has been to the doctor because his balls felt different.



The doctor did an examination and has sent Adam to have a **blood test**.




Adam will have to visit the hospital, or a clinic to have his blood test.

He can take someone with him so he feels supported.



Adam should be able to eat and drink normally before he has his blood test



If Adam is not allowed to eat or drink before the blood test, his doctor will let him know.



Adam's appointment will be between 15 to 30 minutes, but not all this time will be spent doing the blood test.



Some of the appointment will be spent making sure
Adam understands what will happen and making him
comfortable.



Adam will need to take his top off or roll his sleeves up to show his full arm.



Adam can sit in a chair or lay down on the examination couch to have his blood taken. Whichever he finds most comfortable.



The doctor will wrap a band round Adam's upper arm and pull it quite tight.



The doctor will then numb Adam's arm by rubbing some cream on it or spraying it with a liquid.



Adam might be asked to squeeze his hand into a fist.

The doctor will then find one of Adam's veins in his arm and push a very fine needle into it.



Adam should not feel any pain during the blood test, maybe just a little scratch as the needle goes in.



The doctor will then fill some small bottles with Adam's blood.



Once the doctor has finished the blood test they will take out the needle, remove the band, and bend Adam's arm.



After a few moments, Adam will be able to straighten his arm and the doctor will put a plaster on it.



Adam can then put his top back on or roll his sleeve back down.



Adam can go home once the blood test is finished.
